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# A NOTE FROM OUR PRESIDENT & CEO

The demand for connected collaboration was met with tools that they had been using the whole time they had been in EAST. In short, they were practicing emergency preparedness before anyone knew what the emergency might be.

In 20-21, EAST didn't have to reconnect. We just strengthened the connections. When face-toface training was not an option, EAST expanded online training and grew our outreach by 400%. The 2021 EAST Conference was as expansive and innovative as ever—it just moved from one central location to hundreds of smaller ones interacting through five different online channels. Our facilitators kept in constant contact with each other and their support team and, through it all, we demonstrated how the online world allows for a different kind of communication, but one that was more necessary than we could have guessed.

This doesn't mean that personal connections are stronger apart. I know that I value togetherness more than ever. We need to be able to collaborate closely wherever we find ourselves, AND we need to treasure the ability to be together in the real world. We need to be better at BOTH. Educators have long understood that to really serve their students, they should make sure that each one of them is provided with unique learning opportunities—because students are individuals just like the rest of us. Unique and individual, that's EAST—always has been.

The preparation we did created the ability to continue to grow and serve in the strangest school year in memory. Now we look to what's next: solving problems, providing opportunities to learn and grow, these are constant. was held entirely virtually this year for the first time in EAST history.





"Phase 2020 was pivoted to an all-virtual training utilizing the web-based platform Adobe Connect. EAST staff hosted live interactive training on the platform that facilitators could access from any device. In Phase 2021 we took a hybrid approach and used the EAST adopted LMS, TalentLMS, and provided in-person training at EAST. Content on the LMS was created by staff and facilitators could access content on-demand. For each use case, our Facilitators were able to get the interactive, engaging training they needed to become successful facilitators."

# THE WELLINGTON ENGAGEMENT INDEX

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Using the Engagement Index tool, EAST students have been able to share how they feel about their EAST classes with facilitators. Their input is represented by the placement of a dot on an X-Y axis representing their level of "love" and "challenge." To date, we are seeing that students are **as challenged by EAST as they are math and they love it as much as PE**.

### **Project Spotlight**

Sonora Middle School reacted to the rise in carbon monoxide emissions coming out of older boats that began frequenting lakes and rivers in their area. When students learned that a community member was hospitalized for carbon monoxide poisoning after spending time on a local lake, they began building and coding a wearable carbon monoxide detector that is designed to attach to life jackets. This detector creates sounds when carbon monoxide levels reach harmful amounts, signaling for the wearer to leave the water.



# SERVICE

Due to the the pandemic, opportunities to safely serve communities fell. Despite this, EAST students, facilitators, and community partners continued to seek out ways to serve.

# When the pandemic took students out of schools

and forced lockdowns across the country, Monette Manor, a retirement home in Monette, Arkansas, reached out to EAST at Buffalo Island Central High School to help with COVID safety. Four EAST students were able to bring home 3D printers and created over 300 mask extenders for the elderly and frontline workers to wear.

students took advantage of empty school buildings by creating new sensory walks at the Springdale Pre-K Center. The sensory walk was created for children who are mentally anxious or those who have gone through trauma, giving them an outlet to escape and do various activities along the walk.

# TECHNOLOGY

We live in a world that thrives on technology. During the pandemic, the necessity for technology increased both in and out of the brick and mortar classroom.

### "Let's prepare for the future."

EAST was awarded a grant from Arkansas NSF EPSCoR which allowed us to implement the *LETS: Prepare for the Future* program. Over the course of the grant, we will reach 448 teachers throughout Arkansas who will learn how to use emerging technology and practice integrating the technology into their classrooms, inspire the next generation of leaders, and prepare tomorrow's workforce to thrive in the new economy.
